

RECIPES

Lesson 1: Introduce the Topic

Read a Sample:

Read the poems "Spread the Love" and "A Recipe for Baking a Louisa" aloud

What Is It?:

- ⚠ A recipe tells people how to cook or bake something, and what ingredients and supplies they will need.
- We're going to write a fun recipe about what makes you, you!

Parts and Skills:

- Recipes use ingredients, which will be the special things that make you unique
- Recipes use measurements (like cups, teaspoons, dash, etc) to show how much of the ingredients. If you like cats a lot it should be a bigger measurement than if you like soccer just a little.
- Recipes also give instruction words, like "add", "mix", and "stir".

Brainstorm Ideas:

- Let your student brainstorm ideas and write them down for him/her/them.
- They will need to make a list of features about themselves they want to include, and then decide which of those things should have the larger measurements and the smaller.
- Use a graphic organizer. Have your student use it in Grade 3.

Begin Writing and/Or Drawing

- Some young students like to draw the picture first and then write the words to go with it.
- Aim for:
 - ✓ Grade 3: 7-8 lines, with support from you only if really needed after trying themselves first.

Lesson 2: Writing and Illustrating



- Quick Review of Parts and Skills from Lesson 1
- Finish Writing and Illustrating
- Hand In First Draft
- ▶ Between Lesson 2 and 3, you should read through their sentences and circle spelling and grammatical errors (use erasable pencil) without fixing them

Lesson 3: Editing

- Read over first draft with editing together and support while student fixes mistakes. For Grade 3, model how to find corrections using an appropriate tool, like a dictionary for spelling errors.
- Are there any other details to add?
- ✓ Start planning how you will present this piece of work. Some options are: Presenting it to the family at dinner, calling someone and presenting over Zoom/FaceTime, making a video of presentation and emailing it to someone, etc.

Lesson 4: Final Draft and Presentation

- Practice presenting out loud once or twice
- Present work officially in the chosen fashion (make your call, video, etc.)
- Hand in your finished product
- Be proud of yourself for your hard work and effort!

Week 16:

Lesson 1: Introducing Words

- List Words should be displayed somewhere the student(s) can see them all week.
